Legion D' Honnuer



Eric Hudson Awarded Chevalier Legion D' Honnuer

Congratulations to our President, Eric Hudson, who was presented with the National Order Knight of the Legion of Honour, France's highest decoration by the Lord Lieutenant of East Riding, Susan Cunliffe-Lister. The medal was awarded "in recognition of his acknowledged military engagement and steadfast involvement in the liberation of France during the Second World War".

On D-Day Eric served in the Royal Navy aboard a landing craft as part of a special operations team. His ship, H.M.S. LCT-E 311, was ordered to support the out numbered American forces at Utah beach. During the operation the landing craft was badly damaged and the crew were ordered to abandon ship. After helping three non-swimming shipmates to safety on another landing craft, Eric swam 300 yards to the beach. Exhausted he slumped to the floor tripping a land mine that exploded and severely wounded him. He managed to stumble 150 yards to the safety of a nearby wall where American soldiers helped him.

Medics carried out emergency surgery on Eric in a field hospital, before swiftly evacuating him back to England, under the cover of night, believing him to be an American sailor. After some weeks convalescing in an American hospital he was released and returned to his base, H.M.S. Westcliffe where he reported for duty. He was then informed he had been listed by the British as "missing presumed dead".

Unfortunately, due to the injuries he sustained, Eric was unable to return to full active service and was pensioned out shortly after the end of the war.

The presentation ceremony was held on 17th December 2015 at RBL Alderson House and was officiated by Master of Ceremonies Steve Haynes, formerly the Queens Toastmaster, and was attended by Bridlington's Lord Mayor Councilor John Copsey and several of Eric's close friends.

Great Warships of The Royal Navy

H.M.S. NELSON

HMS *Nelson* was one of two Nelson-class battleships built for the Royal Navy between the two World Wars. She was named in honour of Horatio Nelson, 1st Viscount Nelson the victor at the Battle of Trafalgar. The *Nelsons* were unique in British battleship construction, being the only ships to carry a main armament of 16-inch (406 mm) guns, and the only ones to carry all the main armament forward of the superstructure. These were a result of the limitations of the Washington Naval Treaty. Commissioned in 1927, *Nelson* served extensively in the Atlantic, Mediterranean, and Indian oceans during World War II.



Nelson was laid down in December 1922 and built at Newcastle by Armstrong-Whitworth. Launched in September 1925, she was commissioned in August 1927 and joined by her sister ship HMS Rodney (built by Cammell Laird) in November. She cost £7,504,000 to build and made partial use of the material prepared for the cancelled Admiral-class battlecruisers HMS *Anson* and *Howe*, planned sister ships of HMS Hood.

She was the flagship of the Home Fleet from launch. In 1931 the crews of both *Nelson* and *Rodney* took part in the Invergordon Mutiny. On 12 January 1934 she ran aground on Hamilton's Shoal, just outside Portsmouth, as she was about to embark with the Home Fleet to the West Indies.

Nelson was modified little during the 1930s and was with the Home Fleet when war broke out in September 1939. On 25 and 26 September she performed escort duty during the salvage and rescue operations of the submarine HMS Spearfish. Nelson was first deployed in the North Sea in October against a German formation of cruisers and destroyers, all of which easily evaded her. On 30 October she was unsuccessfully attacked by U-56 under the command of captain Wilhelm Zahn near the Orkney Islands being hit by three torpedoes, none of which exploded. Later she was again shown up for pace in the futile pursuit of German battlecruisers. In December 1939 she struck a magnetic mine (laid by U-31) at the entrance to Loch Ewe on the Scottish coast and was laid up in Portsmouth for repairs until August 1940.

In June 1941 *Nelson*, then in Gibraltar, was assigned to Force H operating in the Mediterranean as an escort. On 27 September 1941 she was extensively damaged by a Regia Aeronautica torpedo strike and was under repair in Britain until May 1942. She returned to Force H as the flagship in August 1942, performing escort duties for supply convoys running to Malta. She supported Operation Torch around Algeria in November 1942, the invasion of Sicily in July 1943 and the Salerno operation (by coastal bombardment) in September 1943. The Italian long armistice was signed between General Dwight Eisenhower and Marshal Pietro Badoglio aboard the Nelson on 29 September. The *Nelson* returned to England in November 1943 for a refit, including extensive additions to her anti-aircraft defences. Returning to action she supported the Normandy landings but hit two sea mines on 18 June 1944 and was sent to the Philadelphia Naval Shipyard in Pennsylvania for her repairs. She returned to Britain in January 1945 and was then deployed to the Indian Ocean, arriving in Colombo in July. She was used around the Malayan Peninsula for three months. The Japanese forces there formally surrendered aboard her at George Town, Penang, on 2 September 1945. Nelson returned home in November 1945 as the flagship of the Home Fleet until reassigned as a training ship in July 1946. She was decommissioned soon after the end of the war and scrapped in 1949.

Before the navy I did 3 years at Headlands 6th form but instead of going to university I decided to join the navy as my grandad was a radio officer in the merchant navy. A few months before I joined I went to Dartmouth and did a one week course to see if I wanted to be an officer, but I decided to join as a rating.

After my initial training I went to HMS Collingwood to train as a Warfare Specialist. One week before I passed out of phase 2 I decided to branch transfer to an Aircraft Engineering Technician. This resulted in me having to do phase 2 again at HMS Sultan. I successfully passed my course and I opted to work on fixed wing aircraft. I was then sent to RAF Wittering to complete Phase 2B on the Harrier GR9's and T10's. My first draft was 800 Naval Strike Wing at RAF Cottesmore. I thoroughly enjoyed my time there, the 'crabs' were great people to work with and I have lots of amazing memories of my time there My job title was Plane Captain as I had my own jet that I looked after and was responsible for along with a buddy...



I never got to go on any detachments but I did get a chance to go to Bavaria for a 1 week intense leadership course. I worked on the Harriers until they were decommissioned and I feel privileged to be one of the last people to ever maintain one. After our squadrons disbanded and the base slowly shut down I decided the time was right for me to leave and pursue my next career in civvy street. After leaving I got a job as an assistant bar manager at a local pub, then I was a crematorium operative and now I am currently a Funeral Director at Ernest Brigham's.

Shipmate Roy Smith has moved home and now resides in Stockton-on-Tees. During the time he lived in Brid he was a very active member of our branch. As well as being vice chairman and deputy standard bearer, Roy was also poppy collection organiser for RBL. 
